As we approach another election season, it is imperative that you, the residents of Milltown, become familiar with the issues facing our community. Financial, environmental, and health concerns are examples of important issues that Councilman

Ligotti and I deal with on a daily basis. Your Democratic elected officials have never lost sight of the fact that we were elected to serve all of the residents, not just the residents who we believe will vote for us. Our guiding principles will always be to represent the residents and taxpayers of Milltown in a fair manner, to listen to your opinions, and take action on any issue with the best interests of our town in mind. We will always be transparent in our motives and accountable for our actions, two traits that may seem rare among elected officials.

As a resident of Milltown, you deserve to have your voice heard. Whatever the topic or issue, you have the right to express your opinion to the members of the governing body. I encourage everyone to attend Council meetings and be heard; there is no stronger tenet in our democracy. If you can't attend meetings in person, write a letter or call the Councilperson in charge of the committee associated with your matter of concern. A list of all Council members and their committee assignments can be found on our Borough website.

Finally, when all is said and done, you have the power to decide who will represent you and our Borough on Election Day. If you don't understand an issue, feel free to ask us for an explanation. Councilman Ligotti and I are here to help you not only understand the problems that face our community, but we are here to solve them.

PRESSING ISSUE

Milltown Water and Sewer Rates to Increase

To keep up with the rising market costs of water and sewer demands, Councilman Richard Revolinsky referred to the need for an unprecedented double digit (10%) increase in both water and sewer rates "a necessary evil." Residential users, schools, and churches will pay \$227.23 per year in quarterly installments for sewer costs. The users pay, in addition to the minimum rate, an additional \$3.16 per 1,000 gallons of water consumed. All other users, such as commercial and industrial users, will also pay \$227.23 per year in quarterly installments. These users pay in addition to the minimum rate, an additional \$3.16 per 1,000 gallons for the first 50,000 gallons of water consumed and \$4.42 per 1,000 gallons of water consumed for any amount in excess of 50,000 gallons. For water costs, the minimum quarterly amount of water consumption charges is \$47.14 for a maximum usage of 7,500 gallons. The rate is \$8.55 per 1,000 gallons for the first 20,000 gallons. If consumption exceeds 7,500 gallons in a quarter, the rate is \$10.58 per 1,000 gallons for any amount in excess of 20,000 gallons.

Revolinksy described the reason for the increase as two-fold, saying despite increased costs associated with the operation of our water and sewer systems and infrastructure improvements, rates have not risen since 2010. But noted the impetus for considering any increase at this time was unforeseen sewer disposal bills amounting to approximately \$166,000. Revolinsky believes that to bring

the budget back in line, a 10 percent increase is necessary. Councilman Randy Farkas instead suggested a one-time assessment to restore the funds drawn from surplus (see next page for Municipal Government 101 for an explanation of utility surplus).

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT WHAT IS A UTILITY SURPLUS?

What is the purpose of a surplus held by our electric and water/sewer utilities? Our water and sewer rates were recently increased by 10% each, in part, residents were told, to restore money spent out of the utility surplus. There is no standard amount that is kept in surplus by municipally run utilities (there are only 9 such utilities in the state). Not enough money in the surplus when an emergency takes place means a sudden extreme rate increase would be necessary to pay for the expense. But an excessively large surplus is money that you could be spending on your own home improvements, vacations with family, or the like. With such a large increase in the Milltown water and sewer rates, it is justified that residents want to know more about exactly how the money will be used. What projects? How will those projects improve the lives of residents?

THANKS BOY SCOUT TROOP 33!



In our last issue, we learned about an Eagle Scout Project to construct a Butterfly Garden in the grass field of the Middlesex County open space property

behind the Ice Cream Depot. The Butterfly Garden will be round, approximately 40' in diameter. Based on work with the Rutgers Cooperative Extension to select the correct plant types and location placement, the Garden will have native species of plants such as switch grass, Shasta daisy, and butterfly weed. There will also be herbs including lavender, Russian sage, and chives.

Another Eagle Scout Project has been approved to construct a pressure treated wood guard rail to prevent vehicles from pulling onto the grass of the open space property containing the Butterfly Garden. This guard rail will be 40' in length. The posts will be 6"x 6" and the rails will be 2"x10".

Both Scouts are actively working with residents and businesses to raise funds to purchase construction and plant materials. Any residents who would like to donate can do so through their Scout Leaders: https://milltown33.mytroop.us/aboutus.

We bring this to your attention because fishermen have been seen casting their lines over the Main Street bridge. It's very hard to resist, but please be safe and observe this fishing ban until the waterway has been deemed safe once again.



A registered voter currently not affiliated with a political party may declare their party affiliation up to and including Primary Election day.

A registered voter currently affiliated with a political party who wishes to change their party affiliation must file a Political Party Affiliation Declaration Form 55 days before a Primary Election.

And Important Information about Vote by Mail:

A voter may vote by mail by completing the Application for Vote by Mail Ballot (listed below) and returning the application to their County Clerk.

To receive your ballot by mail, the application must be received by the County Clerk 7 days prior to the election.

A voter may also apply in person to the County Clerk until 3:00 p.m., the day before the election.

The County Clerk cannot accept faxed or emailed copies of an Application for Vote by Mail Ballot, unless you are a Military or Overseas Voter, since an original signature is required.
